
The Problem

- nearly 220 people killed every year in traffic crashes on Houston streets.
- more than 1,000 people seriously injured every year in a traffic crash on Houston streets.
- People walking represent 2% of commute mode share yet 32% of traffic deaths.

All of these crashes were preventable.







High Injury Network

 - How do we replicate the same feedback we would get from a town hall or public hearing?
 - How do we make engagement more dynamic than posts/likes?

Public Feedback: Virtual Open House

- Held via Microsoft Teams
 Video and call-in only options
- Goal to introduce citizens to Vision Zero and ask for live public feedback
- Discussions with local street safety advocates
- Format:
 - -One hour, repeated 4x
 - Entire open house recorded and uploaded to YouTube










Public Feedback: Virtual Open House






Public Feedback: Let's Talk Houston

 - Visibility issues










Public Feedback: 186 survey responses






Question options



June Open House Comment:

Lower speed limits are important. Lower on residential streets AND lower speeds on arterial streets. I was living in Australia when they lowered the speed limit from 60 kph to 40 kph (37mph to 25mph), which was part of their "safe systems" approach. It made a wonderful difference in safety and comfort while walking and biking.
