#### Future Forum Topic Suggestions



- More metrics associated with the initiatives presented, such as reductions in pedestrian/bicycle fatalities.
- Metrics associated with enhancements in street safety (i.e., changes in crash/fatality rates associated with changes in street design and/or driver/pedestrian behavior).
- Working with local decision makers to apply safer policies and funding priorities.
- Crash Modification Factors (CMF) development for ped and bike crashes.
- Innovative engineering solutions, including non-motorized transportation networks.
- Solutions and innovative approaches to pedestrian safety from other countries.
- Overcoming public education and enforcement challenges during COVID or adaptation.
- Pedestrian and bike safety for youth, school zone safety, and implementing countermeasures equitably.
- Law enforcement challenges and adaptations associated with the new pedestrian safety laws starting September 1, 2021.
- Policy and funding changes that are needed to support Road to Zero/Vision Zero goals.










# 102 pedestrians required admission to the Trauma Center SAFETY after being struck by a motor vehicle

Arrival Time of MPC Trauma Team Activations to the Rees-Jones Trauma Center








■ Admissions ■ Fatalities

### 5.8% of pedestrian crashes were work related






Nearly 1 in 3 persons admitted after being stuck by a motor vehicle had either alcohol and/or drug substances confirmed at the time of their admission





# Nearly **half** of patients require immediate operations or intensive care services after being struck by a motor vehicle.

Injury Severity Score	Number of Patients
Minor (1-8)	31
Moderate (9-15)	27
Serious (16-24)	16
Critical (50-74)	3
Unsurvivable (75)	4



### How severely are these patient injured?

The Injury Severity Score (ISS) assesses the combined effects of the multiply-injured patients and is based on an anatomical injury severity classification, the Abbreviated Injury Scale (AIS).


The ISS is an internationally recognized scoring system which correlates with mortality, morbidity and other measures of severity.

Injury Severity Scores range from 1 to 75.
