## TRADITIONAL TOOLS FOR CRIME PREVENTION

#### SYMBOLISM



Symbolic barriers like material changes and landscaping

Direct barriers like signage, fences, and gates

### SURVEILLANCE



Elements that create "eyes on the street", including busy storefronts, increased patrols, lighting, cameras

### ACCESS CONTROL



Widening or Narrowing walkways, gates, bollards, turnstiles to improve or impede access

### MAINTENANCE



Upkeep and investment in the physical environment, such as lighting, sidewalks, and buildings

### POLICING



Increasing police presence in neighborhoods

### TARGET HARDENING



Denying or limiting access through physical barriers like locks or through presence of security

Tools for Implementation in Precinct 4

A MULTI-DISCIPLINARY APPROACH TO PREVENT CRIME BY ADDRESSING THE WAY WE BUILD AND MANAGE PUBLIC SPACE.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SIGNALING**



Encorporating identity into a place through native plants, or culturally relevant art work

#### **ACTIVITY SUPPORT**



Encourage intended patterns of use through program and events

#### MAINTENANCE



Ensuring our public space is well cared for

#### **VIBRANCY**



Public art, seating, lighting, and other elements that encourage "eyes on the street"

### AN OPPORTUNITY FOR IMPLEMENTATION

- Selection of priority neighborhoods was based on crime statistics
- Gulfton, among others, ranks in the top 90th percentile for homicides and assaults in Harris County

- Median household income = \$36,152


















# MERGING PREVIOUS PLANNING WITH CURRENT FUNDING



- Eagerness and support from participants and Houston police to see change










